

Getting Started with the GSA Seafood Processing Standard (SPS) Audit

The Seafood Processing Standard (SPS) is applicable to farmed and wild seafood and covers the four pillars of responsible seafood — environmental responsibility, social accountability, food safety and animal welfare.

SHARE FACILITY REPORTS WITH WALMART


Step 1: Apply for Certification or Recertification

To submit an application, visit the BAP (https://www.bapcertification.org) or BSP (https://bspcertification.org) website and enter the "Certification Portal". Current GSA plants may access an existing account and complete an application. New plants can create a profile, add a facility, and start a new application.

To comply with Walmart requirements, <u>you must be audited to GSA's Seafood Processing Standard with Enhanced Social Accountability (ESA)</u>. An ESA audit includes an additional auditor that is certified by the Association of Professional Social Compliance Auditors (APSCA). You must select this option in the application (*image below*). <u>Note:</u> When you opt into an ESA, you are required to undergo an unannounced audit, which meets Walmart's requirement that audits be conducted as semi- or unannounced by August 1, 2024.

Are you applying for an enhanced social accountability audit?

Opting "Yes" will require an unannounced audit. (Note that there is an additional fee for this service. If you need more information or have selected "Yes" in error, then please contact certification@globalseafood.org for assistance.)

Step 2: Share Audit Report with Walmart

The GSA team will make and confirm links to Walmart. Once links have been made, Walmart will have access to the audit report. Send the certified processing plant name, ID number (P##### or RP#####) to: molly.jacques@globalseafood.org.

Additional Requirements

To be accepted by Walmart:

- 1. The audit must be conducted by an APSCA-certified auditor on behalf of an APSCA member firm. Confirm with APSCA and your selected program that the approved firm and auditor(s) are in good standing.
- 2. Audits must be conducted as semi-announced (within a window of time) or fully unannounced by August 1, 2024.
