


# Feeling sick?



## Same-day testing and treatment can help you feel better fast

Getting tested for common illnesses right away—and beginning the appropriate medication—can help you feel better more quickly and reduce your risk for serious complications.



You can access quick and easy testing and treatment for flu, strep throat, and COVID-19 at a Walmart Pharmacy.<sup>1</sup>

### How it works

If you feel symptoms coming on, walk into a Walmart Pharmacy to receive immediate testing. Or, schedule an appointment for that day (if available).

- **If you test positive**, the pharmacist can prescribe treatment right there,<sup>2</sup> and they will follow up on how you're feeling within 72 hours.
- **If you test negative**, the pharmacist will provide options about symptom management and next steps.

### What you'll pay



#### Not enrolled

**If you're not enrolled in a Walmart medical plan** or have any other accepted insurance plan:

- **Step 1: Assessment (\$50–\$70)**  
A pharmacist will review your symptoms and confirm eligibility first.
- **Step 2: Testing (\$59–\$88)**  
A pharmacist will perform a strep throat, flu, or COVID-19 test by collecting a sample via a swab test in your nose or throat.
- **Step 3: Treatment (Starting at \$4)**  
If you test positive, you'll receive a prescription so you can begin treatment immediately.



#### Enrolled

**If you're enrolled in a Walmart medical plan:**

- **Premier or Contribution Plans:** Pay \$4 for assessment and testing; treatment starting at \$4.<sup>3</sup>
- **Saver Plan:** Pay 100% of the cost until annual deductible is met. Once met, pay \$4 for assessment and testing; treatment starting at \$4.<sup>3</sup>

<sup>1</sup> Available if you work in: AK, AR, CO, FL, IA, ID, KS, KY, MI, MN, MT, NE, NM, NV, SD, TN, UT, VA, WA, WI, and/or WY.

<sup>2</sup> You can receive a pharmacist-prescribed medication as long as there are no contraindications.
